## Nature of funding expenditure 2019-20

Based upon the needs of the individual children, the Pupil Premium Grant Funding has been allocated in the following ways:

- > Dedicated leadership of the Pupil Premium, providing time for analysis to review impact on learning, progress and attainment and pupil voice.
- > Educational visits that improve independence and social skills. Ensuring that disadvantaged children can access these additional opportunities.
- Implementing a whole-school approach to well-being within a school development focus priority, which includes specific interventions (Black Sheep Friendship Terrace); understanding our feelings and emotions linked to PSED Action for Happiness; There are no outsiders in our school etc
- > In-class TA support at the point of need during class lessons
- > Bespoke interventions / closing the gap to support individuals as needed
- Booster clubs
- Learning outside the classroom (swimming additional costs)
- Extra curricular provision
