### Assemblies:

This week's subject assembly was based around RE and we explored the Islamic celebration of Eid al-Adha, the festival of sacrifice. The celebration stems from Allah asking Abraham to sacrifice his son but just before he did, Allah provided a sheep to sacrifice instead. We learnt what it felt like to sacrifice something through sharing sweets with other children and learnt that the celebration is an opportunity for Muslims to show kindness, be grateful and provide for those less fortunate than others.
